11. Health life expectancy is five years longer







Purpose of the strategy



Tackling the challenges

- Understanding power inequalities across the City
- Supporting groups who face discrimination and disadvantage
- Shaping our engagement and empowerment approach in a way that actively addresses them



Guiding principles

- Work with community bodies to ensure those which can contribute to community planning are able to do so
- Seek to understand the distinctive needs and aspirations of communities of place and interest through effective community participation
- Ensure effective community participation informs how CPA manages and scrutinises performance and progress
- Co-production to achieve positive change



Promoting the benefits

Greater participation in local democracy and people influence what happens in their community

Brings people together and gives them common purpose to make things better for the local community

More people volunteering in their communities

Increased confidence and people share knowledge, skills and experience

People are instrumental in contributing ideas and making changes

Greater satisfaction with quality of life in the neighbourhood



Grampian Engagement Standards

Adoption of the Grampian Engagement Standards – 10 standards for good quality engagement based on best practice guidance including National Standards.



8. Self determination	People implement what they decide
7.Co-producing	You work with service users from design to delivery. Sharing all or almost all decisions.
6.Co-designing	You involve service users in designing services. They are involved in decisions but are not involved in delivering.
5. Engaging	People have regular opportunities to express their views and can influence decision making.
4. Consulting	Obtaining feedback by asking people to fill in surveys or attend meetings to say what they think about an issue.
3. Informing	You inform people about your services and you tell people about what decisions you have made and why.
2. Educating	You educate people on the benefits of services. You may try to convince them to act differently.
1. Coercing	You require someone to use their service without understanding their true wants and needs.


